

Study Window for September 2024

Looking out my study window, I am thinking about the Ten Commandments.

Time and again, some group or politician starts a ruckus about displaying the Ten Commandments in schools or other publicly owned locations. When they are successful, frequently the version that is displayed is the King James Version (as if God still "spake" in 17th century English) displayed on a real or faux set of stone tablets. One of the things that strikes me about these dustups is that somehow God's teachings seem to some to be more important when they are carved in stone. As if the choice of writing material makes them more immutable somehow. God's word chiseled in rock.

Of course, if we consider the teachings of the prophets, of Jesus, and of the Apostles we understand that many more important teachings from God have been given than those first few. And if we are honest, we care very little about observing *all* of them. Been out to lunch on Sunday and ordered the "I am violating the sabbath" plate special? I have. Honor your mother and father? Ever been a teenager? And need I say anything about false witness? Or coveting your neighbor's Camaro? You get the point.

Like legislatures everywhere, scripture gives evidence of a philosophy that says that the way to make things better is to expand the original 10 by creating ever more rules! 613 in the Old Testament by one count. But I have never seen all 613 etched in stone. Likewise, I have not seen the more compelling teachings of Jesus or the interpretations of those teachings by Paul and others, committed to granite. Yet, I certainly do not feel as those are less worthy than the original 10.

I know that some Christians, perhaps many, are seeking a religious life that is clearly delineated by definite rules. Rules that feel permanent and timeless. Rules that are metaphorically engraved in stone. I completely agree that rules do serve a purpose in our religious life. But for me, I do not need them posted on the wall or set outside the main entrance to a public building.

Now before you write me off as some sort of heretic, I want to explain why these types of campaigns leave me a bit cold. And it has to do with Ezekiel 36:26. It records these words of God.

A new heart I will give you, and a new spirit I will put within you, and I will remove from your body the heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh.

You cannot write rules very successfully on a piece of flesh. (Before someone says, what about tattoos? Better take a good look at Lev. 19:28.) But you can transform the heart that lives <u>only</u> by adhering to a set of rules into a new heart that may be infused with the Holy Spirit. The Law was given to try to steer humans on the right path. And it can still play that role. But just like cowboys on a cattle drive, they can only get most of the herd to move in *generally* the right direction. But there will be losses, missteps, and strays. Most certainly movement will not be along a completely straight path. But we have been taught that the most important path, however convoluted and surprising it may be, is being "in" Jesus. The same Jesus who broke rules when the situation demanded it. Friends, to live the way that Jesus taught and exemplified takes something deeper and more life changing than just rule enforcement. It takes Spirit-filled living.

The Synoptic Gospels record this familiar story. A rich young man lived a life in full accordance with the law. He wanted to know what he needed to do to inherit eternal life. Jesus told him he needed one more thing designed to shift the man's focus from material wealth and to the plight of his fellow humans. Remember what that was? Elsewhere the Bible reports that Paul was "blameless" under the Law, yet he counted that as loss compared to being in the Messiah. Rules clearly can get us so far...but not all the way home. Jesus will.

So, we can get over the guilt we feel about planting two types of vegetables in our gardens. (Lev. 19:19.) Because we wear clothing made of two different fabrics. (Deut. 22:11.) We failed to build a railing around our roofs. (Deut. 22:8.) Or that we eat cheeseburgers without considering Ex. 23:19, 34:26 and Deut. 14:21. Instead, we must make sure that ours are hearts of flesh, not stone, thereby opening ourselves to the Spirit that seeks to reside in us. We must welcome it in.

But watch out. Doing this will make us new people. New persons in Jesus Christ.

The Spirit blows where it will. Hold onto your hats!
